World heritage expert works in deer stone monument sites

26 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



Mongolia prepared a nomination file for ancient cultural site 'Deer stone monuments, the Heart of Bronze age culture' and submitted it for inscription at World Heritage list in 2018. Accordingly, Mr.Toshio Hayashi, expert from the International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS) worked in Mongolia to carry out a technical assessment. He worked in complex sites with deer stones 'Tsatsiin Ereg' in Ikhtamir soum and 'Ikh Jargalant' in Undur-Ulaan soum of Arkhangai aimag and "Uushiin Uvur' in Burentogtokh soum of Khuvsgul aimag.Mr. Toshio Hayashi held

meetings with authorities and specialists of Education and Culture Departments and Social Policy Departments of the aimags and with governors of baghs /smallest administrative unit/ and inhabitants of the soums where deer stone monuments are existed, to exchange views on safeguarding and conservation and receive information.Expert Toshio Hayashi will submit the report of his work to the World Heritage Committee, which will discuss an issue on whether to inscribe the nominated complex heritage sites with deer stones belong to Bronze Age culture, at its regular meeting to be held in 2020.

Permanent international altaistic conference

18-23 AUGUST, 2019 MÖCKERN



This year's recipient of the PIAC Prize for Altaic Studies, was announced. The recipient, Prof. Dr. Martin Gimm, could not participate for health reasons. The laudator, Hartmut Walravens, elaborated on the multi-faceted and profound contributions of Martin Gimm to the field of Altaic Studies. A short welcome address by this year's President, Oliver Corff, closed the opening ceremony and declared the 62nd Annual Meeting of the Permanent International Altaistic Conference officially opened. After a short break, more than 40 participants from 15 countries and regions (China, France, Germany, Hungary, Japan, Kazakhstan, Korea, Kyrgyzstan, Mongolia, Romania, Russia, Taiwan, Turkey, USA, United Kingdom) engaged in the Confessions. The general theme of this Annual Meeting, Religion and State in the Altaic World, set the continuo for the traditional excursion day. The participants visited the nearby city of Magdeburg and were given

a guided tour of the Cathedral of Magdeburg as well as a tour of contemporary Magdeburg. After a river cruise the participants visited Burg. The local guides started the tour at a statue of Roland, depicted as a king with a drawn sword, signifying the town privileges of a medieval city. The tour ended with a presentation of the church of St. Petri, the Huguenot parish church of Burg, and its living religious tradition. Many participants had asked how institutions like Friedensau Adventist University, the Cathedral of Magdeburg or the parish of St. Petri had managed to survive in socialist times, and thus a short intervention on the history of the former German Democratic Republic and the relationship of church and government completed the historical sketch of this day. The excursion ended with a view from the city's vineyard in the golden glow of the setting sun and a dinner under the open sky.

Academic conference on Khalkhiin Gol Battle being held

23 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



On the occasion of the 80th anniversary of Victory of the Battle of Khalkhiin Gol, the government of Mongolia, Ministry of Defense, National Defense University, and the Institute for Defense Studies are organizing the 'Battle of Khalkhiin Gol - 80' academic conference today, on August 23. Today, scholars' controversies continue over the cause, progress, end, aftermath, and effects of the battle, and even the term used to describe it with views differing about whether it was a war, battle, or border dispute. Thus, the conference is taking place to let the national and

foreign scholars give their views and confer about recent findings, expand cooperation, and determine research methods. Two main presentations are being given on the geo-strategies employed by the neighboring and other countries in regard to Mongolia in the 1930s and the cause, aftermath, and military tactics of the battle and 16 other presentations about the battle. In the conclusion of the event, the scholars will determine directions of their joint research relating to the Battle of Khalkhiin Gol and create a database.

Domestic and foreign Mongolists are meeting under the topic “Heritage of Mongolian Sources at World Libraries”

22 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



An international scholarly conference “Heritage of Mongolian Sources at World Libraries” was held on 22 August 2019 at the Mongolian National University (MNU) with the participation of international Mongol study scholars and researchers. Doctor Ya. Tumurbaatar, Director of MNU and M. Tungalag, the Chief of Innovation Department of the Mongolian Ministry of Education, Culture, Science and Sports and Director of the Science and Technology Foundation, who were invited to the event, spoke briefly about the implementation of the state and government’s policy in relation to science, technology and higher education, and gave an update of the actions taken in this regard. More than 80 researchers, scholars, doctors and

professors, who are exclusively involved in Mongol Study, took part in the conference. They included Mongol Study scholars from the Russian Academy of Sciences, the Library of the Autonomous Region of Inner Mongolia of the People’s Republic of China, and from universities in Germany, Japan, United States and Poland (Warsaw University). The first paper at the conference was presented by R. Otgonbaatar, a senior research associate of the Institute of Language and Literature of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences “On the topic of a manuscript of traditional Beijing print.” According to the two-day conference agenda, 15 papers were presented for discussion and deliberation.

Views exchanged on organization of joint exhibition with German delegation

21 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



President of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences (MAS) D.Regdel received a German delegation led by the director of Kunsthalle Düsseldorf, renowned art historian Dr. Gregor Jansen and Cultural Envoy of Mongolia O.Oyuntuya on August 19. The German delegation is visiting Mongolia to participate in the 'Arts' Eco System' and 'Encountering city-Contemporary Art- German perspective' workshops and discussions organized within the celebration of the 45th anniversary of Mongolia-Germany diplomatic relations.

During the meeting, Mr. D.Regdel noted that the countries have a long history of cooperation in science and that Germany is Mongolia's biggest partner in Europe. The sides also exchanged views on further cooperation in contemporary art and organizing joint exhibitions.

Scholars discussing relations between Mongolia and Japan

20 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



An international academic conference ‘Past, Present, and Future of Mongolia and Japan’ is taking place today at the Mongolian National University of Education. Chairman of the Board of Directors of Soyol Erdem College Mr. Soichi Makihara delivered opening remarks at the event being co-organized by the college and the J. F. Oberlin University of Japan, emphasizing the opportunity to deepen joint research activities further. The two countries

“have now become partners that discuss global and regional matters and collaborate by supporting one another’s stance. This can be seen in Mongolia’s support for Japan to become a permanent member of the UN Security Council and Japan’s support for Mongolia to join the East Asian Integration” he said while remarking that trade turnover between the two countries reached USD 700 million.

Scholars urge to take Khoridol Saridag under protection

19 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



The 'Umarid Mongol' joint research team of the National Museum of Mongolia, the University of Pittsburgh of the U.S, and the American Center for Mongolian Studies discovered a rare finding of three vases full of clotted cream and one vase with yellow butter that were frozen in glacial about 700-800 years ago at a site named Khorig in Ulaan-Uul soum of Khuvsgul aimag. During a press conference where the scholars of the research team reported about their findings and research works they highlighted the necessity of putting the entire region of the

Khoridol Saridag Mountains under special national protection. Despite archeological findings being fully preserved for several hundreds of years in the cool climate of the depression of Darkhad, looters continue to profit off of the artifacts. Aside from 100 tombs at Khorig, many more tombs of Nomt, Ongon and Tsagaan Mountains are known to have been looted so far. Thus, the scholars urge to put the entire region of the Khoridol Saridag Mountains under Specially Protected Area.

The Second International Scholarly Conference “The Roerichs and Mongolia”

16-18 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



The Second International Scholarly Congress “The Roerichs and Mongolia” was held at the Zanabazar Fine Arts Museum in Ulaanbaatar. It was attended by U. Enkhuvshin, Deputy Prime Minister of Mongolia, who addressed the conference. The final sessions of the Congress were held under theme “Tenggerism and Cosmology” on 16-18 August 2019. The conference was jointly organized by the Shambal Museum and the Zanabazar Fine Arts Museum with support from the Government of Mongolia, the Ministry of Education, Culture, Science and Sports and the Minister of External Affairs of Mongolia. Scholars of any countries, including the Russian federation, Israel, People’s Republic of China and Australia, took part in the Congress and presented

papers for presented an interesting information about chemical experiment carried out on a painting kept at the Museum called “The Red Cavalry Heroes,” which was painted by N. K. Roerich and presented to Mongolian Prime Minister B. Tserendorj in 1927. Roerich had created the painting after travelling in Mongolia and it is believed that through this painting Roerich had tried to show and wish that “the time is coming when the people would live a happy life as the King of Shambala Regdendagva was coming heralding the period of Shambala in Mongolia.” During the conference, Mongolia’s Deputy Prime Minister U. Enkhuvshin officially announced the decision of the Government of Mongolia to render financial support to the N. K. Roerich House Museum Institute in St. Petersburg.

800-year-old vases containing frozen clotted cream and yellow butter found from glacial

16 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



The 'Umar Mongol' joint research team of the National Museum of Mongolia, the University of Pittsburgh of the U.S, and the American Center for Mongolian Studies has come across a rare finding of three vases full of clotted cream and one vase with yellow butter that were frozen in glacial about 700-800 years ago. The findings of this summer's excavation is considered to possibly be a new discovery for the international archaeology scene alongside being a discovery related to nobles of the Mongolian Empire. During the research team's work on the protection of looted tombs relating to the Mongolian Empire and collecting artifacts that they found in 2018 and 2019 at the site named Khorig in Ulaan-Uul soum of Khuvsgul aimag, they came across a large amount of artifacts that are highly significant in research, which included the aforementioned vases with frozen clotted cream and yellow butter that were even more of a rare case. Highly significant artifacts relating to the history of

the Mongolian Empire such as items made of gold, silver, iron, silk, bones, hide and cork as well as human and livestock bones have also been found. Specifically, gold relics with depictions of a golden sun, silver moon and deity, earrings and a golden accessory of a belt were unveiled with the several hundred artifacts that included various items such as a leather sack filled with trinkets in silk wrappings, a part of a silk deel with a swastika pattern, dragons and other mythical creatures with golden thread, a part of a leather boot, bow and arrowhead, arrowcase, porcelain and clay vases, bone brush and equestrian equipment. The research team is being led by the Head of the Research Center at the National Museum, Dr. J. Bayarsaikhan and Dr. Julia Clark. These cultural findings are expected to serve as proof of the triumphant history of the Mongolian Empire and have an important role in developing patriotic views and respect for national heritage for the future generations of Mongolia.

International conference “Khalkhyn Gol War – 80 Years”

13-15 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



An international conference “Khalkhyn Gol War – 80 Years” was held in Khalkha Gol soum, Dornod aimag in the country’s east commemorating the 80 years of the victory of the Khalkhyn Gol Battle. It was held on 13-15 August, jointly organised by the Institute of History and Archaeology of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences, the Office of the Governor of Dornod aimag, the Office of the Governor of Khalkha Gol soum and the “Victory” museum of the Khalkha Gol soum. The conference was attended by research scholars from the Special Archives of the Central Intelligence Authority, the institutes of History and Archaeology, Language and Literature of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences, the Pre-Baikal State University of Russia, the General Archives Authority, Central the Archives of the Defence Ministry, the Civil Aviation Authority of Mongolia, the Mongolian

Military Museum, National University of Mongolia, National University of Education, and the National Defence University. Some 20 papers were presented for discussion at the conference, such as “Experience and Lessons Learned about the Military Psychology during the Khalkhyn Gol War,” “Servicemen who were Tried in Court directly from the Khalkhyn Gol War Front,” “An analysis of the content of the history of the Khalkhyn Gol War and general educational curriculum.” Meanwhile, the 80th anniversary of the victory of the Khalkhyn Gol has been also celebrated in different parts of the world. For instance, the Mongolian Embassy in New Delhi, India, with support from the Institute of History and Archaeology of the Academy of Sciences, has commemorated their Embassy Announcement Board with historical photos taken during the Khalkhyn Gol Battle 80 years ago.

Scholars convene for effective usage of terminologies in Mongolian language

13 AUGUST, 2019 ULAANBAATAR



Institute of Language and Literature of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences (MAS), Center for Mongolian Studies of the Mongolian State University of Education and the Tokyo University of Foreign Studies are co-hosting an international symposium under the theme “Consolidating terminologies of Mongolian-speaking nations and creating a joint database”. Linguistics and scholars from Mongolia, Japan, China and Russia are taking part to talk about ways to integrate and consolidate Mongolian language and writing used by Mongolian-speaking people.

On the first day of the event, Kurebito Tokusu, Professor of the Research Institute for Languages and Cultures of Asia and Africa delivered a speech on “Significance of eliminating dissimilarities of scientific terminology of Mongolian language”, Dr. Ts.Unurbayan, Dean of Mongolian Studies Center on “Compared observance on Mongolian scientific terminology” and Dr. G.A. Dyrkheeva from the Institute for Mongolian, Buddhist and Tibetan Studies of the Siberian Branch of the Russian Academy of Sciences on “Usage of terminologies of modern Mongolian language”. Tomorrow, the second day of the conference will be dedicated to speeches on Mongolian terminologies of various fields such as education, medicine, agriculture and natural sciences.
