Extension Secretaries Report
Beginning Jan. 1904

Up to Jan. 1904 the following factories had been entered for distributing circulars and invitations of the Young Women's Christian Association—Johnson's Cigar factory, Baxter's Laundry, Ideal Clothing, Standard Box factory, Brook's candy factory, Putnam's candy factory.

Miss Florence Simms state secy. of Mich. had given a talk at Baxter's Laundry and Miss Susan Gillette Extension secy. of Detroit gave a talk at the Johnson cigar factory.

Mr. Johnson was enough interested in the work to give a hundred dollars toward the salary of a secretary who would give all of her time to the work and visit his factory once a week.

In Jan. 1904 Ellen Walter was employed to give all of her time to extension work.

Jan. 12. Miss Woodbridge, gen'l secy and Miss Walter visited Mr. Johnson and made arrangement for regular meetings in his factory. It was thought best to have general talks, gymnasium exercises, special music, and entertainments, something in which the girls were found to be interested. Mr. Johnson thought the girls were not ready for gospel talks, Catholic girls might object. About two hundred girls are employed. They have a large dining and coffee is furnished the girls at the expense of Mr. Johnson. One end of the dining room is fixed up for a sitting room with a couch and piano.

Jan. 14. The first meeting was held in the Johnson cigar factory. The girls from the third floor and all parts of the dining room were invited to come together for the meeting. They sang "America" very heartily and helped pass the invitations of our "Mid Winter

Rally" at the Y.W. C.A. Rooms. Miss Woodbridge talked about the Rally, giving the girls a welcome

and explained about the weekly meetings which we expected to have in their factory. I gave a talk on "Breathing" which did not interest all the girls. There was a great deal of noise and racked all the time. About a hundred and fifty of the girls were in the room at different times. The girls were not very responsive and did not know juist what attitude to take. In passing around among the girls and talking to them they were quite friendly and said they wanted the meetings. They were very much interested in the idea of having some gymnasium work, and said I should be sure and come again. One of the girls Miss Shook asked to join the Association.

Jan. 13. Miss Lillie Smith and I distributed programs of the "Mid Winter Rally" at the Ideal Clothing factory. The girls were very friendly and seemed glad to have the invitations. Many of them knew nothing of it. Some of the girls expressed a wish that we might have the meetings in their factory.

We left invitations at the Box factory to be distributed.

Jan. 15. Miss Smith and I distributed invitations at the "Standard." The girls were friendly and received us well. One of the girls said she was a member of the "Outing Club."

At the Putnam candy factory we found the girls on the fourth floor dancing. They were very much interested and took us through the chocolate room and very kindly explained the work. They thanked us for coming and asked us to come again.

Jan. 19. Miss Smith and I went to the Johnson cigar factory to hold the second meeting. The Kimble Music Co. donated 200 little books, patriotic songs. The girls passed the books and joined in singing some of the songs. They were all evidently expecting a great show in the gymnasium work. Nearly two hundred girls were in the dining room and after a great deal of urging and confusion about 75 girls formed in crooked lines. The girls who were not in line made a deafening noise. Just as we were ready to begin the exercises the

Elevator with some men on it came down to the dining room floor. This caused more noise and confusion. The girls did the best they could with the exercises, but with all the noise, what I said could be heard only a few feet from me. We ended with a march. Some of the girls were displeased about the noise. The foreman came in after and said it was a big crowd to manage. He hoped that after a while I would be able to give them some advice about keeping the room tidy.

Jan. 21—Miss Sayles from the "Standard" came to the rooms and asked about the factory work. She hoped we would be able to come to her factory. The few Christian girls in the factory would be strengthened by it, she thought.

Jan. 26.

Visited Johnson's factory. Mrs. Patterson went along and sang several pieces which were very much appreciated by the girls. I read "The Raggedy Man" and "Little Orphant Allie." There was less noise and more interest than any other time. Some crowds of girls whispered and

Pretended they did not want to listen. Many of the girls told us they enjoyed it and asked us to come next week. It was quite incouraging. Mrs. Patterson was pleased with it. About 150 girls were in and out.

Feb. 2—Johnson's Cigar factory.

Miss Dickerson went along to play. They did not sing very well. I told them the story of "The Great Stone Face." They were very much interested and few whispered. There was some running across the room in the midst of it all to see some penny pictures a girl brought in. Some were annoyed by the noise. They enjoyed the story and asked for one next week, and thanked me for coming. 79 girls were present.

Feb. 9—Johnson cigar factory.

Quite a crowd gathered around and sang "Rock of Ages." I told them the story of "King of the Golden River." A crowd of Polish girls stuck together and kept up a jabber in Polish. The girls from all parts of the dining room crowded near the piano, there was little noise & much interest.

Mr. Johnson gave me a list of girls who are out of work on account of sickness. Called on Arma Franke, a Holland girl on Kent St. She, her father and mother were quite friendly and seemed glad I called. They have a very comfortable home.

I found Nellie Mc Blelois on McReynolds t after a long tiresome walk in the ice and snow. Her father and mother were in the room but could speak only Holland. All were friendly. After a long walk I was unable to find Lyda Williams.

Feb. 10—I found the house at which Lyda Williams lives, but got no response to my rapping at the door. Went to Watson st to see Stella Schymsack. It was a Polish Catholic family and the father and mother could talk very little English. They asked me several times if I wouldn't come next summer and thanked me for coming. A sister

works at Putnam's Candy factory, and she said the girls there wanted us to have our meetings there.

Feb. 12—Miss Woodbridge and I went to the Standard to see the manager about coming there for noon meetings. This is a branch of the Jackson factory. Miss Ward is the manager and forelady. She was very friendly and at once gave permission

(8) for us to have our meetings in her factory. The girls have only 30 min. noon, and only a few minutes can be spent with them.

We called on Mr. Baxter and easily got consent to come into the laundry to speak to the girls at noon. We were less than one half hour in getting entrance into these two factories.

Feb. 15- I went with Mr. Ley, the factory inspector to see some employer of factories. We went to Fasoldt's overall factory. Only eight or ten girls stay at noon, but we were given permission to come if we liked and the privilege of going through the factory during working hours to distribute literature and invitation.

At Rindge, Kahnback & Logic boot & shoe factory the forewoman said she would be glad to have us come to their factory and have meetings. At the Putnam candy factory, Mr. Bean, the manager gave permission for the noon meetings. He called the forelady who said she would ask the girls whether they wanted the meetings.

Mr. Barker and Miss Eaton at the Brooks candy factory were friendly and gave permission to hold meetings in their factory.

Feb. 16 Miss Lewis went with me to the Johnson factory to play. I talked only a few minutes about the party at the Y.W.C.A. for the Johnson girls. They were very enthusiastic about it and said they would come. We put a poster up in the dining room, announcing it.

Misses Lyda & Jennie Williams from the Johnson factory entered my Bible class. Miss Timmerman from the Johnson factory came to the class last week. Anna Jennings from the Ideal Clothing factory came to the lunch room for the first time and speant the afternoon in the reading and rest room.

Feb. 20 Johnson cigar factory Party—Y.W.C.A.

54 were present and the evening was speant in games and music. The Holland and German girls sang native songs and Mrs. Patterson played. The board ladies furnished the refreshments of coffee & doughnuts. The girls enjoyed swinging on the ropes and rings in the gym. All had a good time.

There is a 2-page insert "Industrial Reading: A Shelf of Books to Suit All Temperaments" between pages 10 and 11. The insert includes a list of 16 books focused on history and problems of industry as well as some Christian titles. This is followed by 6 novels and plays. A brief description of each item is given.

Aug. 22 to Aug. 29	But Miss Blodgett's Bible class, Mr. Gordens "Quiet talks," and other meetings gradually warmed her up to the deeper side of the conference & she came back with enthusiasm and more purpose in her life.

No work during the summer. The Geneva Conference was attended by Miss Lina Mead from the Clapp Clothing and Mary Cramer, Lyda Williams and Lena Geldhof. Miss Geldhof paid all of her expenses. The girls enjoyed it very much. The peace of the whole conference was somewhat disturbed by a friend of Miss Geldhofs who followed her there, got a place to wait tables & stay on the grounds. He kept her away from the evening services and did all sorts of things contrary to regulations or decency. He was finally discharged and ordered off the grounds. He left taking her with him. They came back safely to Grand Rapids.

The discussion of exstension work by girls from the factories was quite an awakening to the girls. It gave them the desire to do more active work and now the lake courage to go ahead and practice just what many girls are doing other places. Miss Mead has much more enthusiasm and determination. Article I. Name and Object.

- Sec. 1. (Name) This organization shall be called *The Association Circle*.
- Sec. 2. (Object) The object of this circle shall be to develop mutual helpfulness and to strive for the improvement of all girls in this factory.

Article II.

Members

- Sec. 1. Any girl who works in this factory may be a member of the circle.
- Sec. 2. There shall be two classes of members with two distinct fees and privileges.
- Sec. 3. (First class) All girls paying one dollar a year into the circle shall be a member of the Young Women's Christian Association of Grand Rapids, and entitled to all *the* privileges *of Associate members* of the Association, entering free classes, other classes by fee, use of reading room and restroom, also all privileges which may be carried on in the factory, such as special class work.
- Sec. 4. (Second class) All girls paying twenty-five cents a year into the circle shall have all privileges of any work carried on in the factory, such as special class work.

Article III.

Officers

- Sec. I.. There shall be a president, secy, treas, and four vice-presidents.
- Sec. II. This circle shall be managed by the officers, Extension secy of the Y.W.C.A. & chairman of Extension deptm. of the Y.W.C.A.

Article IV. Duties of the Officers.

- Sec. 1. The president shall preside at the business meeting of the circle and endeavor to keep in touch with all work.
- Sec. 2. The four vice-presidents shall be chairmen of four standing committees.
- Sec. 3. The secretary shall keep minutes of the business meeting and make written Reports.
- Sec. 4 The treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the circle, collect dues and keep accounts.

BY-LAWS.

- Sec. 1. There shall be four standing committees with a vice-president as chairman of each to plan the work of the circle.
- Sec. 2. Special committiees for othe purposes may be provided. [typos in document]

FIRST INDUSTRIAL EXHIBIT

[handwritten date] May 25, 1906

Most successful and pleasing in every way was the entertainment given last night by the young women of the educational circles of the Y.W.C.A., at their first industrial exhibition.

The rooms were decorated in the association's colors, green and white, and artistic hand-painted souvenirs of the same color scheme were given each member and each guest.

The embroidery work exhibited was done by the members of the Star circle and consisted of colored work on linen, eyelet embroidery and a beautiful waist in shadow embroidery.

Miss Walter, superintendent of the industrial work, opened the program with an appropriate talk, explaining what the association was doing for many of the young women bread winners of Grand Rapids toward teaching them self-usefulness in an educational way.

The members of the Royal circle furnished three choruses, showing that many possess voices which responded to cultivation.

Mrs. Rowland Clark, a member of the extension committee of the Y.W.C.A., gave the greetings, in which she said in part:

"We are all trying to improve ourselves, if we have the right aim in life. And so the industrial and educational work meets with success in the Y.W.C.A."

She reviewed the work which had been done in the past year and showed how satisfactory and beneficial it had been in every way. "For," she concluded, "that which does us the most good is that which we dig out for ourselves."

Miss Snyder, president of the Star circle; Miss Rish of the Royal and Miss Lina Mead of the Mizpah gave very interesting talks about the work done in their respective circles. Miss Hensen, director of the choruses, gave two solos.

The work of the gymnasium classes was a feature of the evening. The girls, under training of Miss Jane and Miss Nordine, have accomplished some very fine work in this line, which would compare favorably with that done in many college classes. Miss Lulu Porter was piano accompanist for the drills.

Page 81 has this single entry at the bottom for May 26:

The rooms were decorated in green & white, the circle colors. Punch was served. The girls from the circle presided at the punch bowl. The chorus class never sang better and hardly a mistake was noticed in the wand drill from the Star Circle & the dumb bell drill by the gym. class from the Royal Circle.
